Maxwell EMS & Cambridge Fire & Rescue

On January 19th, 2021, two Maxwell City Council members, Ken Jans and Alex Golly, and myself, Nancy Pritchard, met with three Cambridge Fire & Rescue members at the Cambridge fire station. Those members were Doris Hackett, Mat Kahler and Ryan Schlater. At that time, Maxwell EMS and City Council members asked Cambridge for temporary help in responding to EMS calls. It was agreed upon that Story County Dispatch would dispatch Cambridge on first page for all Maxwell's calls. If Cambridge's truck left the fire station, they would be paid a minimum of \$50 for each call. If they made it to the scene, they would be paid a total of \$100 for each call. If Maxwell had anyone responding to the EMS call, Cambridge would be disregard as quickly as possible and not continue to the scene. Cambridge is to send Maxwell EMS a bill at the end of each quarter. The agreement will be re-evaluated by both Maxwell and Cambridge on a quarter-to-quarter basis and can be discontinued at any time by either party.

Above is the original agreement between the cities. As of today, August 2, 2022, the City of Maxwell and Maxwell EMS requests to terminate the agreement. We would like to thank Cambridge Fire & Rescue for all the help and support!



RURAL ENRICHMENT GRANT GUIDELINES

The Rural Enrichment Grant program aims to support small quality of life projects that will create meaningful results in rural communities. Developing quality spaces for people to want to live, work, play, and engage will support the vibrancy of lowa's rural places. Eligible projects must be open to the public and contribute to the vitality and engagement of the community. This grant program is a result of the Governor's Empower Rural lowa Initiative's 2018 Recommendations.

The program, defined in <u>Iowa Administrative Code</u>, is administered by the <u>Center for Rural Revitalization</u>, a division of the Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA), in consultation with the Governor's Empower Rural Iowa Initiative Task Forces.



Funding is awarded on a reimbursement basis after expenses have been incurred for approved project activities.



FUNDING

Grant Request Amount

Applicants may request funding for eligible one-time project expenses incurred and expended within the eligible funding period.

Minimum Grant Request: \$1,000

Maximum Grant Request: \$20,000

Match Requirement

Applicants are required to demonstrate investment in projects by providing a minimum of 1:1/2 cash match. The match must be secured, dedicated to eligible expenses, a legitimate part of the proposed project and must be expended within the eligible funding period. The 1:1/2 match requirement may be raised through a combination of public and private sources but may not include in-kind donations of goods or services, unsecured funding or loans. For example, an applicant that requests \$10,000 in grant funds must have at least \$5,000 in cash match. While the minimum match requirement is 1:1/2, competitive proposals will demonstrate broad-based financial support for the project and public funding sources adequately leveraged to seek and obtain private dollars.

- Cash match constitutes actual cash contributed to direct project expenses by the applicant or other funding sources.
- Funding from state government already being used as match from another program, including other funds from the IEDA, cannot be used to meet the match requirement.

Funding Period

All project activities and incurred expenses must occur within the eligible contracted funding period of October 1, 2022 – June 30, 2024. Funding is awarded to grant recipients on a reimbursement basis after expenses have been incurred for approved project activities within the eligible funding period. Expenses incurred before or after the eligible funding period are not eligible for reimbursement.

DISBURSEMENT OF FUNDS

Disbursements will be made on a reimbursement basis. Disbursement claims must be for an amount equal to or greater than \$500 per request. All claims must be made through lowaGrants.gov. When submitting a claim, the following items are required:

- · An invoice, including:
 - Detailed description of expenditures and corresponding amounts.
 - Product invoices and proof of payment for any equipment, supplies or materials purchased.
 - Receipts for any lowa travel expenses.
 - Invoices and proof of payment for any subcontractor payments.
 - Timesheets for any personnel time requested.
 - IEDA may request additional documentation as needed.
- A status report for the claim period. Status reports must be received once per quarter. If no funds are requested, recipients should still file a status report.



REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

In the application, the applicant shall provide a timeline and the goals and objectives by which to measure the success of the project. The recipients' success will be measured based on the progress towards the completion of each goal or objective as outlined in the application.

Quarterly Reports

Each quarter, the recipient must provide an update on the percentage towards completion of each goal or objective and a narrative of the activities taken place in support of the goal or objective.

Recipients shall also provide a narrative description of any deviations from the proposed timeline, tasks and objectives during the reporting period. If the reported deviations will have an impact on the remainder of the project, the recipient must also notify the program manager via email.

Final Report

- The final report will be submitted via <u>lowaGrants.gov</u> within 120 days of the project completion date.
- IEDA will withhold 5% of project funds until the final report is received and approved by the program manager.
- The final report shall contain the following:
 - Executive Summary
 - Timeline for the completion of each goal or objective
 - Narrative description of grant activities undertaken to support the project
 - Narrative description of project achievements
 - Benefit the end product provides or will provide
 - Budget narrative, detailing how funds were spent to support the project
 - Narrative description of any deviation from the original budget, timeline or any grant activity

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Eligible Applicants

lowa businesses, colleges and universities, city or county government, and nonprofit organizations and foundations are eligible to apply. A single entity must be selected to serve as the primary applicant for grant funding applications; however, the project should include collaboration between a consortium of partners. The selected primary applicant must meet the definition of eligible applicant. The applicant will be responsible for submitting eligible material during the funding application process and will be the entity legally obligated to the terms of an agreement if awarded funding. Partners and collaborating entities are not subject to the eligibility requirements but may be subject to financial and programmatic review during the selection process.

- Projects/programs must exist in and benefit a community in Iowa with a population of 20,000 or fewer and not contiguous (sharing a common border) to a city with a population of 40,000 or greater.
- Any eligible applicant may submit an application that includes one or more partners.
- Any eligible applicant will be allowed to submit one application per funding announcement. An applicant who has applied as the principal entity for an application may also be named as a partner on additional applications submitted but may not be named as a primary entity.
- Applicant is local government entity (mayor or city council) or applicant has included letter of support from the mayor or resolution from the city council.
- Federally tax-exempt nonprofit organization incorporated and physically located in lowa.
 - Physical location of the organization is defined as maintaining a current home office and registered agent address in lowa defined by lowa Code 490.501, as well as maintaining a primary staff presence physically located and working in lowa.
- Public or private school serving grades pre-K through 12 and physically located in lowa.
- Nonprofit institution of higher education physically located in lowa.
- Unit of local, county or federally recognized tribal government physically located in lowa.
- · For-profit corporation or business located in Iowa.
 - A business will be considered an lowa business if the business is incorporated in the state of lowa or authorized to do business in the state of lowa.

Eligible Project Requirements

Project requirements for Rural Enrichment Grant awards include, but are not limited to the following:

- Applicant shall demonstrate how the project aligns to the program mission.
- Applicant shall demonstrate eligibility.
- Applicant shall demonstrate the capacity for grant administration.
- Application shall demonstrate the feasibility of completing the proposed activities with the funds requested and contract period.
- Applicant is a local government entity (mayor or city council) or has included a letter of support from the mayor or a resolution from the city council.
- Application shall identify and describe any other sources of funding for the proposed activities.
- Application shall describe how the project will be a replicable model.
- Applications must provide a 1:1/2 cash match (grant can be up to 66% of total project cost).

Eligible Use of Funding

Rural Enrichment Grants support one-time, direct project expenses that are essential to the completion of the proposed project. The grant request must be dedicated to eligible one-time, direct project expenses, legitimate parts of the proposed project, and must be incurred and expended within the eligible funding period. Applicants that include ineligible expenses in the grant request will be considered ineligible.

Eligible grant request expenses include direct project costs such as:

- Artist Fees (e.g., creation, preparation)
- Domestic Travel (e.g., mileage, accommodation, per diem)
- Materials
- Marketing
- Personnel Time Dedicated to the Project* (e.g., planning, execution, evaluation time)
- Professional Services

Eligible Project Examples

The Rural Enrichment Grant program supports projects that enhance the public space in rural communities. The following are examples of eligible projects, please note this list is not exhaustive:

- Parks
- Playgrounds
- Streetscaping
- Signage
- Public Art & Murals
- Pocket Parks
- Trail Enhancements

INELIGIBLE PROJECT ACTIVITIES AND EXPENSES

Funding for existing projects or programs that do not include significant expansion of the project or program are ineligible. The Rural Enrichment Grant Program does not support ongoing expenses for existing programs or projects.

Ineligible expenses include, but are not limited to:

- International or domestic travel (outside of lowa)
- Insurance
- Conference or training expenses for program providers
- · Routine, reoccurring maintenance
- · Ongoing utilities
- · Budget shortfalls
- Fundraising or benefit event activities
- Lobbying activity
- · Prizes and awards

ONLINE APPLICATION SUBMISSION

Applicants must apply via IowaGrants.gov, an online application portal. Applications will not be accepted in any other format. Late, incomplete, or ineligible applications will not be accepted. Applicants must create a login to view the full application for the program.

^{*}Applicant must demonstrate how personnel time is specifically dedicated to the proposed project. Personnel benefits are not eligible.

REVIEW PROCESS

Applications will be reviewed for completion, eligibility and adherence to published guidelines. Applications are reviewed as submitted. New application information or subsequent application clarification submitted after a program deadline is not considered. Eligible applications will be referred to a competitive review by a volunteer panel that includes the Governor's Empower Rural lowa Initiative Task Force members and expert professionals (grant review committee). The grant review committee reserves the right to recommend conditional funding and partial funding of projects. Funding recommendations will be submitted by the committee to the executive director of the IEDA for consideration and approval. The applicant's authorized official will receive award notification. All funding decisions are final.

SCORING RUBRIC

Eligibility Review

Applications must demonstrate evidence of the following:

- Applicant is an eligible candidate.
- Funding request meets eligible project and expense requirements.
- Request is for no less than \$1,000 or more than \$20,000.
- Request includes proof of 1:1/2 cash match for grant request.
- Project duration does not exceed contract period.
- Application is complete and submitted through lowaGrants.gov.
- Applicant is a local government entity (mayor or city council) or applicant has included a letter of support from the mayor or resolution from the city council.
- Primary Applicant is not named as Primary Applicant on any other applications; however, can be named as partners on additional applications.

Extra consideration is provided to projects that have been endorsed by the Iowa Great Places Citizen's Advisory Board (additional five points added to score total), those located in a Hometown Pride designated community (additional five points added to score total), as well as those located in a community of 5,000 or fewer (additional five points added to score total).



Application Review
The Rural Enrichment Grant Scoring Rubric will be used to evaluate applications. Each section has criteria and corresponding point values to ensure a fair review process. The rubric is on a scale of 52 points.

Community Forestry Grant Program Description and Instructions

The lowa Legislature appropriated state infrastructure funds to the lowa Department of Natural Resources (lowa DNR) to be used for a community-based tree planting program for derecho recovery tree planting. A total of \$250,000 in matching funds are available for 27 impacted counties. Additionally, through the USDA Forest Service & National Association of State Foresters (NASF) 2022 State Urban Forest Resilience Grant Program, the lowa Department of Natural Resources (lowa DNR) received funds for Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) Reforestation funds. A total of \$250,000 in matching funds will be made available to those same counties that also suffered losses from EAB. The Community Forestry Grant Program provides reimbursable grants ranging from \$500 to \$5,000 to be used for the purchase and planting of trees suitable to Iowa. Award recipients are required to provide a dollar-for-dollar cash match for the purchase of trees and materials from Iowa businesses. For this round of grants, award recipients in counties impacted by both the August 10, 2020 derecho and Emerald Ash Borer will be awarded federal EAB Reforestation funds as a dollar-for-dollar match for state infrastructure derecho recovery funds. Award recipients will be reimbursed up to \$5,000 of derecho recovery grant funds and \$5,000 grant match funds.

These Community Forestry Grants are available to state and local governments entities, schools and volunteer organizations, and service organizations involved with local urban and community forest services, for planting trees on publicly owned lands owned by state, county, or local governments and located within the State of lowa (DNR lands are not eligible). Qualifying public planting lands include, but are not limited to, street right-of-ways, parks, school grounds, courthouse lawns, public buildings, fairgrounds, cemeteries, libraries, and trails.

- 1. Applications will be posted on July 22, 2022.
- 2. Applications are due September 1, 2022.
- 3. Awards will be announced Thursday, September 15, 2022.
- 4. Key objectives are to establish community tree planting projects on public lands. Federal Urban Forest Resilience funds are in response to the loss of ash due to Emerald Ash Borer and State Infrastructure funds are a response to August 10, 2020, derecho damage and to aid in recovering lost community canopy cover.
- 5. Eligible areas include the 27 lowa counties in the 2020 Governor's disaster proclamation that have also been impacted by EAB. See map and list for eligible counties.
- 6. Applicants must be regional or local units of Iowa state, county or city government, local governmental departments, school districts, volunteer organizations, and service clubs involved with local urban and community forestry resources. Eligible projects must occur on public lands within the state of Iowa (DNR land is not eligible). Examples of planting areas include street landscaping/right of ways, public schools, city and county parks, community sports complexes, public lands arboretums, courthouses, law enforcement facilities, public libraries, cemeteries, fairgrounds, and trails.
- 7. The Community Forestry Grant Program requires a \$1 for \$1 match in local funds (in-kind match such as staff or volunteer time cannot be used) for grants from \$500 to \$5,000 to plant trees on public areas for the fall of 2022. For this round of grants, applicants will be awarded that match from federal Emerald Ash Borer reforestation funds.
- Trees must be landscape-sized and purchased from local lowa nurseries and garden centers. Landscape-size starts at #5 hard pot, air-pruned container, growbag, or balled and burlap trees. Preference will be given to air-pruned containers and growbags.
- 9. The grants are reimbursable and each grant will be paid pursuant to the provisions of a Grant Project Cooperative Agreement entered into between the grant recipient and DNR. Reimbursement will be paid on the basis of the approved percentage of all eligible expenditures up to the amount of the approved grant. To receive reimbursement, grantees must first complete the project by the project completion date stated in the grant announcement, undergo project inspection by a DNR forester, and submit all required documentation including proof of payment. All requests for reimbursement must be submitted and postmarked by Friday, December 9, 2022.
- 10. Allocated funds may only be used for tree or landscape plantings on public areas in Iowa identified in the application form. Special requests may be made (buildings and vehicles are not eligible) but will require a more detailed description of the request and need.

- 11. Priority will be given to: (1) demonstrated need from the impact, (2) cost-effectiveness of the \$1 for \$1 cash match, (3) community involvement, (4) meeting Tree City/Campus/Line USA designation, and (5) species/genera diversity and environmental impact.
- 12. Expenditures for the match made between September 15, 2022 and December 9, 2022 will qualify. Applicants may use funds to purchase plant materials, products, and services purchased from lowa firms. In-kind and personnel funds will not be awarded.
- 13. Complete applications must include:
 - a. Application materials including a proposal, briefly describing the eligible applicant and a detailed project request, including the derecho grant amount requested and the federal EAB match requested, and the proposed project completion date and make-up date between September 22 and October 31, 2022;
 - b. Commitment to and description of 10-year maintenance plan; and
 - c. Map of Planting Site (8.5"x11").
 - d. Completed applications shall be signed by an authorized official.
- 14. EAB Reforestation grant match for all projects is federally funded through CFDA #10.664 from the US Department of Agriculture through the Forest Service Office. If your entity is required to have a single audit in accordance with OMB circular A-133, a copy of the audit report will be provided to the DNR if any findings noted are related to the award provided by the DNR. If no findings relate to the DNR award, a notification letter will be provided to the DNR stating findings noted did not relate to the DNR award.
- 15. Applicants awarded a Community Forestry Grant must provide a current IRS Form W-9, Federal ID, and Current SAM registration. Applicants must sign a **Grant Project Cooperative Agreement** with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources.

Community Forestry Grant Program - Fall 2022 Frequently Asked Questions

How much of the grant is reimbursable?

Award recipients will be reimbursed \$1,000 to \$10,000 for their community tree planting project. For this round, projects will be funded by both state infrastructure funds for derecho recovery (\$500 to \$5000 total) and federal EAB reforestation funds (\$500 to \$5000 total). When completing the budget proposal in the application, please split the total cost for each line item between both sources of funding to reflect the dollar-for-dollar match.

Example: Your project requires \$7,000 of funding. Your budget proposal would include \$3,500 of state infrastructure funds and \$3,500 of federal EAB funds for a total request of \$7,000.

Should I submit multiple applications for multiple projects/planting locations?

One applicant (a local government entity, school, service organization, etc.) can submit an application for multiple projects or locations for up to \$10,000. If the total amount exceeds \$10,000, please submit separate applications. If your planting project will cover a large area or multiple locations, you may attach a planting map for each site location. Reminder: Eligible applicants include state and local governments entities, schools and volunteer organizations, and service organizations involved with local urban and community forest services, for planting trees on publicly owned lands owned by state, county, or local governments and located within the State of Iowa (DNR lands are not eligible). Applicants must have a current IRS Form W-9, Federal ID, and Current SAM registration.

Does my application need multiple quotes from nurseries? What nurseries can I work with?

Applicants only need to submit a quote from the nursery (or nurseries if you need to work with more than one) they plan to order from. Nurseries must be located in lowa. The recommended list of tree species in the application can help you determine what nursery to work with based on what they will have in stock. If you need assistance finding a nursery, contact Janessa Hollmaier - janessa.hollmaier@dnr.iowa.gov.

Reminder: Trees must be landscape-sized. Landscape-size starts at #5 hard pot, air-pruned container, growbag, or balled and burlap trees. Preference will be given to air-pruned containers and growbags. If it can be avoided, please do not make substitutions. If a substitution is necessary, please let DNR staff know of any changes.

How are the applications scored?

Scoring criteria includes: detailed project summary and maintenance plan, demonstrated need for tree funding due to loss from both the derecho and EAB, cost-effectiveness, community involvement, species diversity (ideally ≤10% of total trees is one species and <20% of genus), positive environmental impact on the area, and Tree City/Campus/Line USA designation.

When will it be announced what projects were awarded?

Awards will be announced on September 15, 2022. Award recipients will be emailed an award letter and cooperative agreement that will require signatures. Award recipients also need to provide a current IRS Form W-9, Federal ID, and Current SAM registration.

Reminder: Communicate with the nursery you are working with that September 15 is the date that award notifications will be sent out.

When does our planting project need to be completed?

Planting projects for this round need to be scheduled between September 22 and October 31, 2022. Please plan for a make-up date that also falls within this date range in case of poor weather or other unforeseen circumstances. Once the planting project is complete and has been inspected by DNR staff, you will receive an email requesting final documents that are due by December 9, 2022.

Reminder: If your project is awarded, please keep DNR staff updated with any changes (date, time, project details, etc.).






